The PSB is an assessment model that has at its heart the development of the values, skills, attitudes and behaviours required for children to succeed and flourish in an ever-changing world. Children are encouraged, recognised and celebrated in their achievements, and directly prepared for the next step of their educational journey.

WHAT IS THE PSB?

A programme of study for children that aims to prepare them for the challenges of life as young adults in senior schools academically, personally, socially, culturally and spiritually. It does so by actively developing and tracking knowledge, skills and attitudes.

PSB TEAM

The PSB is overseen by a Board of Trustees who are responsible for ensuring the philosophy and direction of the organisation is in line with its founding principles. The management of the PSB is through the Heads' Committee who elect a Chairman, presently Duncan Sinclair of The Schools at Somerhill.

PSB SCHOOLS

A number of senior schools are Associates who work with the PSB to monitor and advise at moderation meetings.

All member schools provide Leaders who have a key role in moderation and inter-school liaison.

MEMBERSHIP

There are now over 30 junior and prep schools in the PSB and over 20 senior schools that work closely with the PSB, providing staff and resources for meetings. Additionally, the majority of senior schools accept the PSB certificate for entry at 11+ / 13+ together with their own entrance tests or core ISEB examination papers.



WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?

SO HOW ARE WE GOING TO DO THIS?

SKILLS MENTORING

Children from Year 1- Year 6, in their year groups will meet with an academic mentor. This mentor won't necessarily be their class teacher. The mentors will meet twice a week with their tutees, to discuss how they are developing their learning habits and skills across the curriculum. The academic mentors will be responsible for all matters pertaining to learning habits, skill development and academic progress. It is envisaged that meaningful, individualised, learning and skill targets will be set – and discussed – in these groups.

Mentoring will focus on the discussion and development of the habits and skills across the whole curriculum.
